Welcome back to the start of a new school year, it has been very busy with many new enrolments and the induction of new staff. We are still working to complete our staffing structure for 2019 due to a couple of late resignations but we hope to have that completed in the next couple of weeks. I can hardly believe we are already at the half way mark of term one and Progress Reports are available. This is an opportunity for everyone to assess how they are progressing and ask themselves this question. How can I improve my outcomes?

We have welcomed eleven new staff to the college at the start of 2019 and they are working in the following areas. Over the summer break we had a number of works completed and I would like to thank our college grounds keeper, Joe Galea who coordinated these projects to improve the environment we all work and learn in. A delivery of new furniture for LRC and outdoor furniture for the area between the rugby field and the 700's building has arrived and will be in place soon. Concreting has been completed between the 100's and 500's building and our plan to eliminate the areas covered by stones is progressing nicely. New student lockers have been installed to replace old lockers along the 600's & 700's. A new oven has been installed in the canteen to enable the canteen to provide recess snacks and hot lunches to our students. New blinds have been installed in rooms 406 & 408, the admin area and meeting rooms.

Our student Captains, Vice Captains and Leaders for 2019 have been selected and the students who proudly represent the student body are:

These are a very important roles and our student leaders make an enormous contribution to the school community. This week on Monday they ran the first whole school assembly and they did such an outstanding job that I have formally handed them the responsibility of running all our assemblies in 2019

To finish off I would like to congratulate our 2018 Year 12 students. Our graduating VCAL students have now started in employment or further study. In 2018 the PCSSC ATAR scores had a significant improvement especially for students achieving ATARs above 70. 2018 ATARs in the 90s - 8, ATARs in the 80s - 15, 70s - 16. This is excellent news, our top ATAR was 98.65 our highest ATAR to date. We had an outstanding result for those VCE students who applied through VTAC to gain university entrance; 97.28% of Point Cook Senior students received a round one offer. Thus, all students that attended Point Cook Senior Change of Preference appointments received an offer. We had 9 students receive an offer at the University of Melbourne compared with 1 student in 2017, 7 students into Monash University and 31 at RMIT University and 22 RMIT TAFE. I look forward to hearing of their achievements in the years to come.

I look forward to working with everybody in our college community throughout 2019 to achieve successful outcomes for our students.




Year 11 Orientation Program



Attendance – Every Day Matters

There are times when we will need to contact you, including on the day if your child is absent and you haven't informed the school as to why. Do we have your most up to date contact details? If not, please contact the school on 9395 9271 so we can update our records. Please include parent/carers' name, address, phone numbers, email address and emergency contact details. Please remember to contact the school if any of these details or your circumstances change.

Notify the school of your child's absence

Protecting the safety and well-being of children through the reporting and monitoring of absenteeism is the responsibility of both parents/ carers and schools. Please remember to call the school on 9395 5157or email at <u>point.cook.senior.sc@edumail.vic.gov.au</u> or log your child's absence using our school's IT platform Compass early in the morning if your child is going to be away or late for school so your child's absence can be recorded correctly.

Our school will text you as soon as practicable on the day if a student is not at school and you haven't notified the school as to why. If you are notified by the school that your child is away without a reason, please contact us as soon as possible by calling the attendance hotline on 9395 5157 to let us know where your child is. If we cannot reach you because we don't have your correct contact details (i.e.: message notification fail, disconnected number), then we will make contact with any emergency contact/s nominated on your child's file held by the school, where possible, on the same day of the unexplained absence.

Please remember it is your responsibility to contact us to provide an explanation for your child's absence from school, and where possible, please inform us in advance of upcoming absences.

This system also promotes daily school attendance. Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education, they learn new things every day – missing school puts them behind.

Some important information:

- An 80% attendance rate is the equivalent of missing one day per week or 40 days per year or over 2/12 years P-12.
- An 85% attendance rate is the equivalent of missing 30 days per year.
- A 90% attendance rate is the equivalent of missing 1 day per fortnight or 20 days per year.
- A 95% attendance rate is the equivalent of missing 10 days per year.

BENEFITS OF EXERCISE FOR COPING WITH STRESS

- Exercise reduces levels of the body's stress hormones, such as adrenaline and cortisol, which reduces the experience of stress.
- Exercise helps to reduce muscle tension associated with elevated sympathetic nervous system reactivity.
- Exercise increases the efficiency of the cardiovascular system/ flexibility and stamina for encountering future stressors.
- Exercise results in the release of beta-endorphins reducing pain and stress levels.
- Exercise leads to a focus on breathing and perfecting a repetitive motion, leading to calm feelings like meditation.

Talia is currently completing second year of a double degree Bachelor Laws/Global Studies at Australian Catholic University (ACU). She is also a recipient of the Passion for Laws scholarship. Whilst Mikaela is working at the Werribee Mercy Hospital following the completion of studies in health at Victoria University. We wish both alumni students ongoing success and greatly appreciate their shared knowledge and presentations which inspired our students.





What's happening in VCAL

What a great start we've had to 2019 with the VCAL students. First up we had our RMIT orientation program alongside the VCE program where we heard from Mikaela Bourke, a former Point Cook Senior Secondary College VCAL student. Mikaela spoke about her VCAL experience, about resilience, and never giving up. In class, we've been studying 'employability skills' such as team work, planning & organising, communication and initiative and enterprise. Specifically, in Senior Personal Development Skills we've been using our planning and organising skills by organising a class excursion. Students had to research venues, undertake risk assessments, communicate to venues, ask for permission from the Principal class and present their ideas. In Senior Work Related Skills we have been working on career exploration where by Year 12 students have completed individual research using a number of careers websites and presented their findings. We have commenced workplace hazards investigations including violence, bullying and death in the workplace. Students have commenced securing their work placements and are working well towards becoming job ready. In Literacy we have been studying the movie 'The Blind Side' and the link between racism in society and sport. We have written a review on the characters, our expectations on the film and have been researching 'Coming of Age' themes.

In our Year 11 Intermediate VCAL program, Personal Development



Students have been researching Road Safety Issues and have been completing their social media images and social media posts for the 'RACV Safe Mates program. The program allows students to be creative contributors in a road safety campaign. It is an opportunity for young people to have their say about road safety and to help their mates stay safe on the roads. In Work-related skills students have been researching their particular occupation of interest. They have been researching the working environment, how they may be employed, the laws governing employment, stakeholders in the workforce and how the workforce is changing and Occupational health and safety. All in all, it has been a busy first 5 weeks and

we're looking forward to sharing our new projects with you in the coming year.

Point Cook Senior Careers

Point Cook Senior Careers office has been very busy throughout December 2018- February 2019. Our college had 147 Year 12 students (from 2018) apply for University and TAFE courses. We are delighted to announce that 97.35% of students received a tertiary offer through VTAC. Students were accepted into many institutions including, RMIT, Victoria University, The University of Melbourne, Monash University, Deakin University, Deakin College, Kangan Institute, The Gordon TAFE, Latrobe University and ACU. Students were also accepted into an array of courses including Science, Biomedicine, Psychology, Fashion Styling, Education, Nursing, Engineering, Law, Design, Justice and many more courses. Since graduating from our college in November many other students have also been successful in obtaining apprenticeships and full time employment. A big congratulations to all our graduates from 2018 and we look forward to hearing about your successes in the near future.

Scholarship application support is an important part of the careers office role. I am excited to inform that our students were awarded a number of scholarships. For example, The University of Melbourne Principal Scholarship \$5000, Victoria University Academic Achievers Scholarship Higher Education \$20,000 and \$5,000 VU TAFE Scholarship. Western Chances also awarded 7 Point Cook Senior students' scholarship of up to \$1100 per student to assist with textbooks, Myki and other funds to support their university studies.

In 2019, 15 Year 12 students have commenced School Based Apprenticeship Traineeships (SBATS) in Building & Construction, Automotive, Business and Hospitality. These students will spend one day a week at TAFE attaining a Certificate III qualification and one day a week working in their specific career Industry area.

Throughout 2019, Point Cook Senior Careers department will be offering careers exploration curriculum activities, incursions and excursions to support all students in Year 10-12 by using the WIRL program and the Point Cook Senior Career Tools website. We look forward to a very productive year and continued ongoing support to best prepare our students to achieve their pathway/career aspirations and goals.



Successful swimmers will now move onto the Hobsons Bay Division competition which is held on Tuesday 19th March at the Werribee Outdoor Pool.






Alice Pung Year 10 English Incursion

Bicycle Helmets

If you are a CSEF (Camps, Sports & Excursions Fund) recipient, please contact the school before consenting to any event so that we can adjust the costing.




