Principal's Report

It has been a very busy first five weeks of term two with lots of student activities happening and our School Review. Term two has started smoothly, the students have settled back into a normal routine and the staff are pleased to be getting into the rhythm of teaching onsite. I still have concerns about the long-term effects on student's academic progress and wellbeing as a result of the last two years pandemic restrictions, however we have put a range of supports into place that, to date, have enable us to help those students that need it. Our MYLN's, Tutor and Wellbeing Teams are doing incredible work in this space and I applaud their outstanding efforts.

The new 2022 School council met for the first time on Thursday 19 May and I would like to thank all our parent, student and staff representatives for there time and effort, the school council is an essential and important part of the college organisation and is essential for the functioning of our financial, policy and buildings and grounds processes. The new School council President is Anthony Rhook, the Deputy President is Ian Muir and the Treasurer is Nicole Rosen.

We began the 2022 PCSSC School Review to assess our progress against the 2018-2022 Strategic Plan on Tuesday 10 May when the Review Panel Fiona McKenzie (Reviewer) Simon Haber (Challenge Partner, Principal Tarneit Senior SC) Danijel Banovic (Challenge Partner Acting Principal Homestead Senior SC) and Judy Maguire (SEIL) met with myself, our Assistant Principals, Shaun & Kate and Our School Council President Anthony Rhook to validate the PCSSC Pre Review Self Evaluation. The Reviewer discussed with us and met with staff and students to determine whether our self- evaluation was an honest assessment of our work against the School Strategic Plan over the last four years. At the end of the day Fiona gave us the impression that we had completed a very successful evaluation of our four-year journey, but we will have to wait for the written report to have that confirmed.

The two Field Days that had been scheduled for Monday 16 May and Tuesday 17 May had to be cancelled due to Fiona falling ill and were rescheduled for Monday 23 and Tuesday 24 May.

The Final Review Day will be held on Wednesday 1 June and we will get a report from the Reviewer within the next 30 days which will inform us of how we have gone from the panels perspective and guide us in which direction we will go over the next four years in our new Strategic Plan.

I would like to thank those parents who volunteered to take part in the focus group discussions, you are all a very important part of our school community and your participation is highly valued.

Principal's Report

There has been a wide range of wonderful engaging programs commenced this term for students across all year levels to support them in their return to an as "normal" routine as possible after the covid lockdowns and school closures these have included the Drumbeat sessions with our College Youth Worker Sunny Macleod every Tuesday, MAPPS on Youth Suicide prevention, Café Exchange sessions with our Engagement Counsellor Susan Camilleri-Cline which have produced some amazing aromas from the Food tech area, our Sudanese students are participating in a research project with Victoria University to support their community, and three of our students represented the college at the NRL Indigenous Round on Thursday night and held the Torres Strait Islander flag and Aboriginal flag during the opening ceremony. The college community also celebrated IDAHOBIT day The International Day Against Homophobia, Biphobia and Transphobia which is observed on May 17 and aims to coordinate international events that raise awareness of LGBT rights violations and stimulate interest in LGBT rights work worldwide.

On Friday 20 May we held our annual Athletics day and Big Day Out where students competed in all the usual track and field events as well as a range of alternative activities for those who didn't want to compete in the athletics. It was a colourful event with students wearing their house colours and the Year 12 students coming in fancy dress. Thank you to those students who assisted on the day with marshalling and event organisation. Congratulations to Demon House who were the 2022 winners, the Demon House collars are yellow.

And finally, congratulations to all students and staff at PCSSC for your work with School Wide Positive Behaviours. As a school we have been awarded a Blue Award for our progress and work with SWPB. The award allows us to use the banner, at the bottom of this column, on our website and in publications such as the Newsletter to celebrate our achievement. There is a student group working with a sign writer to have a banner made to hang in the college so there will be a permanent reminder of this wonderful achievement.
