

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

My experiences today, the second last day of term, reflect quite nicely some of the key elements of the school at this time of year. It is an exciting time in many ways, with some projects finishing up and others just beginning.

I was privileged to spend some of today in our senior VCAL classes. The students were presenting their school improvement projects, and I was struck by the thought that had gone into the original concepts, the level of research, the thoroughness of the proposals and the professionalism of the final presentations. The plans for elaborate gardens, seating areas and recreational grounds were extensive and intelligent. This is typical of the effort and demeanour demonstrated by our Year 12 VCAL students all year. Their community work, their workplace learning and their engagement with peers and staff have all been outstanding. We are enormously proud of all they have achieved this year and the way they have represented the school.

I also had an opportunity to look in on our Unit 3&4 VCE students sitting or preparing for their practice exams — and was pleased to see the level of application to this important time. The practice exams have provided an opportunity for these students to test their current levels of knowledge and technique. The results will provide some very useful feedback to our students on where they are at in the process of preparing to do their best in the upcoming exam period.

Of course, most students undertaking VCE Units 3&4 subjects are now entering a period of intensive revision, and will be using much of the period from now until the exams to fashion and implement a well-organised and effective revision plan. For many, this includes classes and/or revision lectures over this September break period. I would like to wish our year 12 students the best during this period and express my thanks to all staff who I know will be working very hard to support them during this challenging and exciting time.

Today we also received the final proofs for the flyers for our annual Arts and Technology Exhibition (see right). Rebadged MAD Fest, the exhibition will feature works in the areas of Media, Art, Design, Drama and Dance and will be preceded by a week of student activities celebrating creativity and the Arts at Point Cook Senior. The Arts program is an essential element of the curriculum offered at the school, and the Arts

and Technology Exhibition is an important part of that program. I hope you can put Thursday 19 October in your diary and can come to see the wonderful creativity and talent of our students on that afternoon.

And then this evening was the time for our parent-student-teacher interviews. It was great to see so many of our students and their parents take the opportunity to meet with the teachers and discuss progress and next steps. It doesn't matter how well a student is doing in his or her subject areas, there is always room for those "next steps"; and the opportunity for the students, their families and the teachers to reflect on and promote those next steps together is very important. This three-way partnership is so critical to each student's growth and development over his or her time at Point Cook Senior.

In finishing, I would like to wish all our families a happy, healthy and safe September break, and I look forward to seeing all our students return in two weeks' time, ready for another term of learning and growth.



It was a very solemn occasion. We had the RAAF marching band, the naval guard from H.M.A.S. Cerberus and a Catafalque Party bearing Lee Enfield 303s (the weapon used by the Australian military during both World Wars). All guests were attentive listeners, and were keen to hear stories from fallen soldiers and those who are still with us. We Value Respect

Point Cook Senior has adopted the Positive Behaviour Support Framework for as the cornerstone for our student wellbeing approach. The Framework is research-based and has as its foremost principle a positive approach to student management.

The first of our value words to promote a positive learning environment is 'respect'. The behaviours that result from respect should be seen in the interactions between students and teaching and support staff in each of their daily interactions. It will be seen through the respectful conversations that are had as the learning takes place in the classroom. It will also be observed in the yard as students are cognisant of each other and are mindful of their interactions. Respect is also a value that is shown towards the tangible aspects of the school — it's buildings, property and also the property of members of the school community.

The behaviour matrix outlines how 'respect' is shown across all of the different contexts within the school. All students and staff use the matrix as our reference point in discussing behavioural expectations.

Changes at PCSSC

This term the SWPBS posters have been displayed around the yard and in each classroom. They serve as a visible reminder of the values and expectations we have for each other.

Staff have also been recognising the positive behaviours that they observe, by giving students a postcard. If you notice that one of your children has received a postcard, please talk about it with them, as they are likely to be very proud of it.

Respectful Relationships

Respectful Relationships at Point Cook Senior Secondary College

Point Cook Senior Secondary College has taken a lead role as a Respectful Relationships school. Although respectful relationships have been embedded into the school culture since its inception, the adoption of the Education Department's "Respectful Relationships" initiative strengthens the school's commitment to embedding the teaching of respectful relationships in the curriculum, promoting gender equity, challenging gender stereotypes and supporting members of the school community to combat domestic violence.

Evidence Based Research

The important role that schools and early childhood settings can play in long-term prevention of family violence was highlighted in the Victorian Royal Commission into Family Violence. The Royal Commission heard a range of evidence from experts in the field that made clear that for there to be a reduction in rates of violence in the long-term, attitudes and behaviours must change; and schools were identified as being fundamental to this change.

 $\underline{\mathbf{I}}$ n addition to this, research into the effectiveness of social and emotional learning programs highlighted the impact they can make to improved wellbeing, and to social and academic outcomes for students. Students who participated in rigorously designed programs, such as Respectful Relationships, showed:

- increased positive social behaviour
- improved academic outcomes
- reduced involvement in risk taking behaviour

As a result, Respectful Relationships will be rolled out to all Victorian Government schools over the next three years.

How will Respectful Relationships be Implemented?

The implementation of Respectful Relationships is a school-wide initiative that involves commitment from all members of the school community and the development of six key domains:

- · culture and environment
- support for staff and students
- community partnerships
- teaching and learning
- professional learning strategies
- school leadership commitment

Pilot lessons of the Respectful Relationships curriculum will be implemented through the Advisory program in 2017, with full implementation beginning in 2018. Students will cover topics such as:

- emotional literacy
- personal strengths
- positive coping
- problem-solving
- stress management
- help-seeking
- gender and identity
- positive gender relationships

The college is committed to the teaching and embedding of Respectful Relationships into our ethos as a means of continuously building a culture of respect, equity and community safety.
