## Year 10 Community Applied Entrepreneurial Projects!

During Term 4, Year 10 students are required to practically implement their Community Applied Entrepreneurial projects that they spend approximately 7 weeks working on. These projects are design to foster community engagement among students, encouraging them to be proactive members of our local community.

Three Year 10 groups from Miss Baker's CAEP class attended local schools in Point Cook and conducted lessons. All three groups thoroughly enjoyed their teaching tasks and were successful with their learning intentions. The lessons included teaching social/collaboration skills, teaching sign language and teaching students about the negative impacts of bullying, particularly in relation to racism. These Year 10's would like to extend their appreciation to Point Cook P-9 College and Carranballac P-9 College for allowing them to run their teaching projects at their schools.

Other projects implemented have included running a "lunchtime cinema" where students from PCSSC could provide a gold coin donation for entry to watch movie and eat popcorn at lunch. Donations were then submitted to the Australian Red Cross Foundation. Another project had two students run a Kahoot in advisory class designed to foster student interest in a new sport. The students then surveyed Kahoot participants in order to gauge whether a new interest had been sparked. Additionally, two groups volunteered to help improve our local community through a rubbish clean up – one group specifically focusing on cigarette butts at the Town Centre, and the other group spent time walking around the local streets surrounding PCSSC to aid in keeping our immediate environment clean.

This year has been a very exciting one for the Theatre Club. Not only was 2022 its first year of operating, but we actually managed to put together a school production, in just over a term!
